### **Profile of Anna Wallerman**

Anna Wallerman is an associate senior lecturer at the Department of Law, and an active member of CERGU's network of researchers. This autumn, Anna will move to Florence to be a postdoctoral researcher at the European University Institute (EUI).

Congratulations on your new job, Anna! The competition for a postdoc position at a renowned institution such as the EUI must be very high.



What was your strategy when applying, and why do you think that you were offered the job?

Thank you! As far as strategy goes, I think mentorship was the basket I put my eggs in. All postdoctoral fellows are assigned a mentor among the EUI professors, and the availability of a suitable mentor is one of the factors in the selection process. I spent quite some time working my way through the bios and publications of the professors in order to see how my research project could fit into the research already going on at the Institute. This also helped me to improve my research proposal, as I discovered papers and perspectives that I had not been aware of before.

I also obsessed quite a lot over my cover letter, or "Academic Career Statement" as they call it. I have never been much good at cover letters (but I will become – it is on the EUI curriculum!), but in the end I decided to pour my heart out and wrote the most personal cover letter I have ever written. So I guess they just like me for who I am!

The research project that you will work on at the EUI is called "As you sow, so shall you reap? The influence of the referring court on the preliminary ruling of the ECJ". Could you say a few words about the new project and how it relates to your previous work?

Certainly! Broadly speaking, my research has focused on courts and judges. More specifically, I perceive judges as active, thinking, deciding, ultimately political actors, and I am especially interested in the interactions between judiciaries on national and European levels.

My new research project combines these perspectives. The study concerns the preliminary reference procedure, which allows courts in the EU Member States to address legal questions directly to the European Court of Justice (ECJ). The

hypothesis is that the person who asks the question has an impact on the answer. This would mean that national judges can influence the development of EU law by asking (or not asking) certain questions, or asking them in certain ways. I will study the orders for reference sent by national courts to the ECJ and the judgments sent back in response, and see if I can find signs of a strategic use of the preliminary ruling procedure on the part of the national courts, and if an actual influence on the ECJ can be detected.

Starting to work at the EUI does not only mean that you'll be working in a new professional environment, but also that you'll be living in Florence, Italy. What are your expectations, both professionally at the EUI, and about living in Tuscany?

This is the most amazing opportunity, and I have high expectations on the EUI as an intellectual environment. Above all I expect to learn A LOT. The aim of the Max Weber Programme, which I will be part of, is to equip the fellows with all the skills necessary for an academic career, so in addition to my research project there will also be seminars on teaching, grant application writing, presentation skills. Also, it will be a melting pot in terms of both nationalities and disciplines, and I hope for all kinds of interesting discussions – not only in the seminars, but also over a glass of wine in the sunset.

As for Tuscany, well, there's the wine, the food, the climate; art, history, scenery – need I say more?

You are an active member of CERGU's research network, and you participate in the social and research-related activities on a regular basis. How do you think that this involvement in CERGU has contributed to you being offered a position at a multidisciplinary and Europe-focused research institution such as the EUI?

CERGU is a brilliant way of broadening one's perspective and learning to think outside the box of one's own discipline. It has definitely helped make me dare the leap into questions and methods that are not so common in the legal community. In the end, though, I think the main CERGU contribution towards any success is the sheer enthusiasm of each and every one of its members, and the genuine interest they all take in our common field.

CERGU Tuesday breakfasts always make me remember why I choose academia. This helps to keep focused on the ultimate purpose of it all and brings energy even to, say, the umphteenth revision of a postdoc application. That kind of everyday joy constitutes, I think, my main debt of gratitude to CERGU and the CERGUites.
