## 1 Fighting Disease

For the first time a vaccine against malaria has shown that it can save children from infection or death. \_\_\_\_\_. But because malaria kills more than a million people a year, 700,000 of them children, even partial protection would be a public health victory. The disease is found in 90 countries, and drug-resistant strains are spreading.

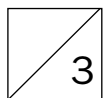
