Director's Letter



"Cowslip, meadow saxifrage, catfoot and blue viola", is the traditional refrain for early Swedish summer. A metonymy for a world beginning to blossom. This season Cherkasy, Chernihiv, Donetsk, Kharkiv, Kherson, Kyiv, Lviv, Luhansk, Mariupol, Mykolaiv, Odessa, Sumy, Zaporizhzhia, Dnipropetrovsk, Poltava, Rivne, Vinnytsia and Zhytomyr drown out the nostalgic song, and are becoming familiar names all over Europe.

Russia's invasion and war in Ukraine have cost thousands of lives, and ruined cities and lives for decades to come. They have also shaken our naive assumptions about the relative

stability of Europe. In light of this, our own petty struggles with hybrid seminars and lectures can feel insignificant - but also more important than ever. As we wrote in our statement against the invasion CERGU is determined to do our share to contribute with multidisciplinary perspectives on European politics and history, rule of law, migration, and other topics. There are many in the CERGU group who can contribute to a better understanding of the parameters of this crisis. European researchers are in high demand, and multidisciplinary perspectives are vital in the analysis of the short- and long-term implications of what is now taking place. Here CERGU has a unique position at the University of Gothenburg to provide both researchers, politicians, administrators and the public with better knowledge and preparedness for the future.

The last years have shown that normal does not mean predictable or stable. The war silenced any belief that we were returning to a pre-pandemic world. The effects on energy, food and other trade have a large impact on transition politics and climate crisis responses, as well. Not to mention NATO expansion.

We must also do what we can to support and make heard the researchers and citizens in and from both Ukraine and Russia who despite the dangers they face stand up for reason and humanitarian ideals. Independent research, open information and public discourse are key to democratic dialogue.

Although the war in Ukraine and all the effects it has already had on the military, political and economic terms demand a lot of our attention, it should not overshadow all the other important areas of interest. This spring semester CERGU has organised 16 events, from the 25th annual Europaperspektiv, via hybrid working seminars, to a Science Festival program on

the <u>Unknown Europe</u>, to a conference on <u>A Jewish Europe</u>. We have had help from fantastic interns, hosted research applications and welcomed international guest researchers: we have moved into our new headquarters at Pilgatan 19A, and eventually gotten the new signage up. We have also provided the triannual external evaluation team with data, background, and analysis to secure an evaluation report that will be helpful in the future developments for CERGU.

It has now, after three years, become time for me to hand the baton over to the next director of CERGU. Andreas Moberg is an excellent choice to continue the development of the European research milieu at University of Gothenburg. I will instead return full-time to the museum world – at Gothenburg Museums and Kunsthalle. I have learned so much at CERGU, on so many levels. From more people than I can name. Still, I would especially like to thank Angie, Ann-Kristin, Birgitta and Kristina for their daily commitment and support!

However, we have managed to make the best of an uncertain situation and hosted all of the events during the spring both onsite and online! The annual Swedish-language event, Europaperspektiv, took as its theme this year 'The EU Between Federalism and Flexible Integration'. Several presenters joined the event onsite, and others presented and commented via Zoom. Hosted just days before the Russian invasion of Ukraine, this timely event utilized scholars who have been very much in the spotlight since then, including Anna Södersten (SIEPS), Fredrik NG Andersson (Lund University), Jacob Öberg (Örebro University), Malena Britz (Swedish Defence University), and Jörgen Hettne (Lund University). - CERGU Steering Committee member Mats Andrén and International Advisory
 Board member Stefan Berger. The theme is <u>Europe from the Margins</u>. CERGU will
 also facilitate the participation of former postdoc Ettore Costa and Eutopia affiliate
 Elisabetta Nadalutti. Apart from a future project application involving PhD-positions,
 the seminar aims to result in a journal special issue to advance the theme.
- Martin Westlund, PhD candidate in law, who is part of the project <u>Separation of Powers for 21st Century Europe</u> (<u>SepaRope</u>). CERGU covered some of his accommodation costs in Amsterdam so he could establish research contacts with project partners and others working in similar legal fields.
- Adea Gafuri, PhD candidate in political science, has been awarded a CERGU grant to
 cover expenses related to her travel and accommodations in connection with a
 research visit at William & Mary's Global Research Institute in Williamsburg, Virginia
 in the United States. In Adea's own words, "I plan to analyze the effect of aid from
 both democratic and autocratic donors on democratization processes (I) focusing
 on the European Union's democracy assistance abroad and (2) authoritarian donors'
 impact on citizens' perceptions of democracy, studying Serbia, a representative case
 of authoritarian donors' influence in Europe."
- Anne Schumacher, PhD candidate in languages and literatures, has been granted funding from CERGU to cover travel and accommodation-related costs for archival

visits in Berlin. Her research will contribute to her dissertation, entitled "Deserters in Postwar German Literature (1949-1961)."

Each researcher granted funding is expected to hold a seminar open to the CERGU network, where their work is presented and discussed. This new strategic initiative will strengthen European-related research activities involving PhD-students. Applications are welcome throughout the year and decisions are made on a rolling basis, or until the funds for the year are exhausted. Ukraine Statement

On March 3rd 2022 CERGU issued a joint statement on the situation in Ukraine:

The Centre for
European Research at
the University of
Gothenburg CERGU
stands in solidarity with
the people of Ukraine in
the face of a brutal,
illegal and unprovoked
invasion by the Russian
Federation. In particular,
we underline our
support for university
students and staff in
Ukraine, with whom we
share the values of open



debate and academic freedom.

We stress the importance of supporting and giving voice to all those – academics and citizens – from both Ukraine and Russia who, despite the dangers they face, stand up for reason and humanitarian ideals, and speak out against this threat to the peace and stability of Europe. Independent research, open information and public discourse are key to democratic dialogue.

CERGU will continue to contribute to an open debate on shaping a more peaceful, cooperative and democratic Europe, offering multi-disciplinary perspectives on European politics and history, the rule of law, migration, and other topics. We urge European and international powers to do their utmost to support Ukraine in their hour of need; to welcome and support refugees; and to work towards a return to a peaceful and cooperative Europe 'whole and free'.

CERGU Welcomes International Conference Guests

During May and June, CERGU organized two international conferences on very divergent topics. First was CERGU postdoctoral researcher Maja Hultman's conference entitled "A Jewish Europe? Virtual and Real-Life Spaces in the 21st Century". The conference was held at Humanisten on the University of Gothenburg campus over three days in early May, and included 25 participants from all over Europe and the United States. Maja coordinated the conference with the University of Southampton in the UK, and received funding from several different foundations including The Parkes Institute for the Study of Jewish/Non-Jewish Relations, the European Association for Jewish Studies EAJS, The Wenner-Gren Foundations, and Riksbankens Jubileumsfond. The conference included two keynote addresses, which are available for viewing online.



The second conference was held recently and arranged by Jonas Hinnfors from the Department of Political Science at the University of Gothenburg. This conference was also a three-day event focusing on the topic of "Practical Social Democracy". 20 international scholars gathered in Gothenburg to discuss social democracy and practical implications. The conference also included two keynote presentations by Marika Lindgren-Åsbrink and Ania Skrzypek entitled "Contemporary Challenges to Social Democracy" and by Andrew Adonis, entitled "The Social Democratic Experience". The keynotes will be available online once they have been edited and captioned.
